Message From Al Runnels, ASMC National Executive Director to ASMC Chapter Presidents:

First, thank you for your contributions to the defense financial management community and for your dedication to ASMC. As you know, ASMC is proud to support the collective efforts of our membership in contributing to the effectiveness of defense financial management.

I'm reaching out regarding ASMC Membership Growth. As most of you know, only about 33% of the 54,000 total DoD and USCG defense financial managers are members of ASMC. I believe this percentage should be significantly higher. As a Chapter President, one of your most important responsibilities is to build your own chapter membership and foster the professional growth of our larger defense financial management network.

In addition to your and your Membership VP/Chair's extremely important activities in reaching out to potential "new" members, it is essential that you contact defense financial managers in your area whose membership in ASMC has lapsed. Please be aware that ASMC HQ transmits five membership renewal messages, one during each of the three months prior to expiration and one each during the two months following expiration, to individuals. Also, about once a year, I personally send a note to former members whose membership has lapsed for four months to two years. The last time I did this we had about 180 former members in the 4-12 month expiration category renew and 20 in the 12-24 month category renew.

By taking advantage of ASMC's many programs and services, members are benefiting their career and the defense FM community. Through ASMC, members have opportunities to support each other in finding solutions to challenges, sharing best practices, and networking across a community of approximately 18,000 colleagues many of whom share common interests and are also committed to their profession.

Defense Financial Highlights. Due to the volume of late-breaking news, everyone should watch for updates on the ASMC website (<u>www.asmconline.org</u>) frequently.

Enhanced Defense Financial Management Training (EDFMT). The EDFMT is a forty-hour class designed to introduce participants to a spectrum of financial management topics, including DoD (rather than Service-specific) financial management policies and procedures. This course also prepares employees to take the Certified Defense Financial Manager (CDFM) examinations. Employees should check with the American Society of Military Comptroller (ASMC) to review all qualifying criteria for the certification. There are currently two Air Force-sponsored EDFMT courses scheduled for the local area: one at



JBSA - Fort Sam Houston from 26-30 October 2015 and one at JBSA - Randolph from 20-24 June 2016. For more information, go to https://www.atrrs.army.mil/edfmt.

Virtual PDI 2015. For those who attended PDI 2015, access to Virtual PDI was included in the PDI 2015 registration fee. For those who were unable to attend PDI 2015, Virtual PDI allows individuals to earn CPEs towards the CDFM program for \$99 (approximately \$1 per available CPE/CET) and is available here. Participation in Virtual PDI allows you to self-certify CPE/CETs for the CDFM Program, however, based upon DoD policy, participation in Virtual PDI does not provide direct credits toward meeting DoD FMCP requirements.

ORGANIZATION SPOTLIGHT

Air Force Medical Operations Agency (AFMOA)

The Air Force Medical Operations Agency sprang from the ashes of the former flight medicine department of the Air Force Medical Service (AFMS) in 1992. Though it originally cared for operational matters under the direction of the AF/SG (Surgeon General) as a field-operating unit, as AFMS duties changed, so did those of the AFMOA. The AFMS moved to more of a proactive approach, managing population health rather than episodic care to improve the health and lives of Air Force members and their families. This in turn led to an increase in AFMOA responsibilities; the Agency expanded to optimizing medical resources, radiation protection, aerospace medicine, and clinical excellence, among other interests. Originally activated in 1992, AFMOA is now located at Port San Antonio (formerly Kelly AFB).



AFMOA oversees execution of the Air Force Surgeon General policies supporting Air Force expeditionary capabilities, healthcare operations, and national security strategy. It provides expert consultative leadership support to 75 military treatment facilities and eight major commands to ensure cost-effective, modern, and prevention-based healthcare continuum for 2.6 million beneficiaries worldwide. AFMOA directs and supports the clinical currency of 43,131 healthcare professionals providing 6.6 million visits and 133,500 bed days. It provides clinical and population health data and analysis to AF/SG and MAJCOM surgeons. The agency partners with the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Health Affairs), Secretary of the Air Force, Chief of Staff of the Air Force, and the Department of Veterans Affairs.

The position requires about 2 hours per week plus attendance at a monthly board meeting. Since 1983, the Randolph Area Christian Assistance Program (RACAP) has been meeting the needs of local citizens in crisis by providing them with emergency food and financial assistance. Conceived by the ministers of area Christian churches, RACAP is sustained by food and financial contributions from sponsoring churches, individuals, organizations, and businesses. No government funding is received. The Schertz Housing Authority provides the RACAP facility at 307 Pfeil Street in Schertz. RACAP is incorporated in the State of Texas as a nonprofit organization and is exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501(a) as an organization described in Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

In 2014, RACAP provided emergency groceries for 1,170 families. The estimated value of the groceries provided to those families was \$96,215. RACAP also paid \$17,475 in rental assistance, \$30,359 in utility assistance and paid \$5,107 in prescription assistance. RACAP's Back-to-School Shoe program approved assistance to 438 children from 187 families. The 2014 RACAP Holiday Meal Basket program provided 267 families with a Thanksgiving Meal Basket and 343 families with a Christmas Meal Basket.
